

Bude Canal Trust Report WORK IN PROGRESS from Jan to March Spring 2019 January

The season for tidying up and burning the cut autumn brash and walking a selected section to survey work priorities. Reports were coming in of trees having been cut down on the far bank between Vealand Bridge and beyond the Incline Plane.



Following the collapse of our trolley, just a few bags were transported by wheelbarrow to the deepest sunken area.

The boardwalk extension, south of the incline plane has had the anti slip mesh applied to the surface (Photo 2) and a delivery of twenty bags of road scalpings to Virworthy Wharf made the start of infilling the dips in the footpath that remained after scraping away the accumulated excess mud the previous spring, a priority.

After cleaning out the Wharf building our resident member in the adjacent cottage offered his assistance to transport all the remaining scalpings to the dips in the footpath with his mower and trailer giving the two volunteers time to level them out. More bags will be req'd to finish the work.

February





Unfortunately a complete shortage of volunteers to start the month and then down to just one volunteer who offered to walk the length of the footpath the following week searching for trees and branches blocking the safe passage of walkers. Two overhanging branches were removed between Brendon Bridge and DNR.



And the remaining brash at Vealand was burned. Five big fires in total, normally planned as a job to help keep warm but this year coincided with the hottest February days on record.

<u>Annual General Meeting – 24th February 2019</u>

AGM day was a beautiful bright sunny day, unseasonably warm but welcomed. The day's events started with a short visit to the Canal from the Sand Wharf up to just before the bird hide. The Chairman and a few members walked the route with areas of interest being highlighted and explained by the chairman, Chris Jewell. These included the sand trade, the railway branch line extension to the Wharf in 1907, the three Falcon Bridges, the Upper Basin, and the former premises that were once important to the functions of the Canal. The location of Stapleton's boat yard, and premises which used to be a timber sawmill for the boat yard, and a foundry for casting iron parts, such as wheels for canal tub boats, were also pointed out. It was a very pleasant little trip and a good start to the day.

On return to the Castle Heritage Centre at about 11am, the Willoughby Gallery was reconfigured to allow the presentation by Mr Ray Alexander, Chairman of the IWA – West Country Branch to take place. Mr Alexander's presentation was about the various waterway projects that are currently being progressed in the Branch area which covers Cornwall, Devon, Somerset and Dorset. These included works on the Rolle Canal, Stover Canal, River Parrett, and Bridgwater Docks. This was an interesting and informative presentation which shows what can be done when effective partnerships between authorities and communities are created. The presentation was well received and appreciated by the members present.

It was then time to reconfigure again to allow our lunchtime buffet to be served which was most timely welcomed and enjoyed by all. A smallish select band of diners had a pleasant break in the day's proceedings.

After lunch the room was set up for the AGM at 2.30pm, which started promptly.

The Chairman welcomed the members present and thanked them for their attendance. Last year's minutes were accepted and signed by the Chairman.

The Chairman gave his report, the main points of which were

- A volunteer has come forward and will take on the position of Hon Treasurer and Membership Secretary as from March 2019. He is Mr Tony Philp and is a resident of Bude. He and his wife have joined BCHS. He is most welcomed and will ensure that the Society can comply with its Constitution and Charity Commission requirements.
- In mid 2018 BCHS sent a reply to Cllr Paynter's letter re the future of Bude Canal querying comments made about the workings of the Canal. No reply has been received.
- The Chairman then highlighted events in relation to Bicentenary year and asked members to support them if possible, in particular the Celebration Buffet and Entertainment on 23rd July 2019 at the Falcon Hotel, which is anniversary day. This is a bookable event. BCHS also has a commemorative booklet and mug available to purchase. The new display about 'Bude Harbour and Canal The Early Days' has been produced and is on display at the Heritage Centre until 28th February. This was mainly funded by a Cornwall Council Community grant of £500 supported by Cllr

Peter LaBroy.





- Bude Stratton Heritage Festival is on 21/7/2019, and BSTC is funding the transport costs for the two replica tub boats of Mr Wills to be brought to Bude for display on that day.
- The General Data Protection Regulations 2018 have been complied with but brought its own administrative complications in ensuring members refreshed their consent to use their email address.
- The Chairman thanked his fellow Trustees for their support and efforts during the past year. He also thanked Cllr S Browning, the BSTC representative on BCHS, for his contributions into our deliberations.
- The Chairman then addressed the meeting about a cash flow situation that BCHS has on its working account. This is due in part to reduced fundraising income but also the income from subscriptions was now not enough to support the Society's expenses for a whole year. The current range of subscriptions have not been increased for many years. The Trustees have decided to review this and as from September 2019 the subscriptions will be increased for all classes of membership, as follows;
- o Concession £5 up to £10
- o Full £10 up to £15
- o Family £15 up to £20
- o Corporate £20 up to £30
- o Life £120 up to £180
- There is, of course, some risk in that members may not respond to the increase and not renew but without this increase BCHS will have ongoing financial difficulties. To aid the income BCHS will only attend events where there is no table charge and will endeavour to run two coach trips this year which are usually well attended and make a good surplus. He added that he hoped members would support the increase and accept them to the benefit of the society.

The Secretary then gave his report which is reported elsewhere in this Tub Boat.

The Treasurer gave his report on the accounts and membership which is also reported elsewhere in this Tub Boat. The meeting continued with the accounts being approved by members and the appointment of the Inspector of Accounts. Leonard and Co were accepted again as Inspectors for 2019.

The election of Trustees followed. Three Trustees were resigning as per rota, Mike Moore, Lesley Moores and Anne Longley. Mike Moore was not seeking re-election. Lesley Moores and Anne Longley were accepted as Trustees for another three years as there are more vacancies than candidates.

The final business was questions from the floor. There were none forthcoming. The room was reconfigured again and the new display panels set up so that members could view them before the end of the AGM.

The Chairman presented Mike Moore with a card and a bicentenary mug as a token of thanks for his support and work whilst a Trustee.

By 4pm the Gallery was set up for the coming week's exhibition and members made their way home. All in all it was an interesting and varied day.

AGM Secretary's Report

After the Chairman's report, the Secretary then reported on the routine activities of the Society during the last year. The Society started the year with 7 Trustees, two of which were re-elected at the 2018 AGM. At the March Trustee meeting Chris Jewell was elected as Chairman, Mike Moore as Treasurer, and Peter Daniel as Secretary. The Charity Commission returns were updated in May 2018 and are therefore up to date. The Secretary summarised the year's activities including 12 Trustee meetings; sales stalls at a limited number of events; talks and visits for other groups; representation on BCT Partnership and BVMAG; and the manning of the Barge Workshop at Helebridge on Sundays from the beginning of July until September. There have also been regular meetings with Bude Canal Trust; this is a new arrangement of working together which has been beneficial, especially as we lead into the Bi-centenary year. The annual summer coach trip to Falmouth and Truro took place.

Anne Longley and Lesley Moores were due, on rotation, for re-election as Trustees and were duly elected. Mike Moore was also due for re-election but is standing down as a Trustee; at the end of the meeting he was thanked by the Chairman for all he had done for the Society and presented with a gift.

Treasurer's Report

The balances on the accounts at the end of each year were as follows:

The financial activities for 2018 followed a similar pattern to the previous years but there were some changes in both Income and Expenditure in Account 1 compared with 2017. Although we ran our coach trip, which we did not do in 2017, there was a reduction in our other fundraising activities. Some of these were cancelled as we were unable to get the help which is needed to set up our gazebo so we are now concentrating on table top sales which we can manage more easily.

The major change in 2018 is on Account 4 which is now being used for the Commemorative Events associated with the 200th Anniversary of the start of the building of the Bude Canal. The remaining balance of the grants received in 2018 which amounts to £2500 will be spent in 2019. Other than that, there were no other exceptional items to report.

The accounts for 2018 have been inspected and approved by Leonard & Co and a proposal to appoint them as the Inspector of Accounts for 2019 was passed at the AGM. Note for comparison purposes:

The Exhibition - 'Bude Harbour and Canal - The Early Days'

The exhibition ran from 16th February to 28th February 2019, 10am – 4pm at the Gallery, The Castle Heritage Centre, Bude.

It was generally well received by those who visited and looked at this new display. Over the period approximately 500 people viewed it and of these 243 people gave it a more concentrated viewing, many of them looking at and reading all or most of the 16 new panels on display.

We have received comments that it should be permanently on display at the Heritage Centre, and that it should be converted into a booklet for publication. The Trustees have not decided as yet what could or should be done. In fact, on reflection, I have realised that in the section about 'Interesting people c. 1800 -1850' there are two notable persons who are deserving of a panel each. These are Sir Thomas Dyke Acland and Sir Goldsworthy Gurney, both of whom have strong connections to Bude and the Canal in their own right. This would make the total panels up to 18.

If you missed seeing the exhibition in February 2019 it will be on display for at least Heritage Day 21/7/2019 and probably at the celebration buffet on the evening of 23/7/2019 at the Falcon Hotel, Bude.

Bude Valley Management Advisory Group

At the recent meeting on the 18th March 2019 the main points of interest for the Canal & Harbour were as follows (since Sept 2018)

i. Coppicing where necessary

- ii. Water Vole Survey. Numbers have levelled out and there are more natural predators in the area
- iii. Repairs to the woodwork on Whalesborough Accommodation Bridge iv. Repairs to inland locks will be done in May/June i.e. repointing, and fixing gate/chamber paddles
- v. Mr Don Martin, CC Environment Manager, is developing a brief to be able to seek funding re the erosion and condition of the banks. This needs to be ready for consideration by CC in the Autumn for capital funding.
- vi. Dredging. Upper basin only. Awaiting funds from CC's capital expenditure. Also a licence to work in areas where water voles present.
- vii. Planekeeper's Path remains closed with diversion. Gareth Cann is seeking sources of funding for this permissive path.
- viii. Sea Lock has had repointing done. Painting to be done.
- ix. End of Feb/early March large holes in Breakwater have been repaired.
- x. The former route of the Sand Railway, now a walkway, has large interior voids. Works is in progress to fill the voids with special concrete and repoint the wall.
- xi. Sea Lock chamber to have sand removed from 1/4/19. Approximately 700 tons of sand which will be moved to mooring area. Storm chains will be taken off with a view to allowing boats to lock out from 25/4/19.
- xii. Harbour Master has had enquiries from boats to visit and lock in.

At the meeting of this Committee on 14th March 2019


- 1. I expressed our thanks to the Castle Manager and his staff for their usual courtesy and help during the exhibition
- 2. Advised them that the Bideford Youth Pipe Band will be attending Heritage Day at our expense.
- 3. Reminded them that the Mayor would be invited to the Celebration Buffet on 23/7/19 as our guest and that there would be a presentation to BSTC made at that event.
- 4. The Heritage Development Officer, Mrs King, reported that the Facilities Manager had stated that the Barge Workshop should have water and toilet facilities provided for volunteers. He is happy that volunteers can open the premises throughout this summer as usual but stressed the long term plan for more adequate facilities will have to be looked at, especially if the workshop is to be opening for longer.

She also reported that BCHS volunteers have worked on the tide mill timbers to remove debris so that the carpentry marks are more visible. She is working on new interpretation which will be in place for the summer.

<u>Looking Back</u>
Interesting extracts from "Looking Back" published in the Bude & Stratton Post.

6 October 1894

Owing to the closure of the canal, Marhamchurch villagers have to depend for their supplies of water on two wells. In the summer months these are inadequate to meet the demand on them. For some time efforts have been made to improve the existing supply. In aid of thisa sale of useful and fancy articles was held in connection with the harvest festival on Tuesday.

1 October 1904

Bude Urban Council on Friday accepted the tender of Mr Herbert Stappleton, Bude, of £430 for constructing and hanging new outer lock gates.

26 January 1929
Stratton and Bude urban council have accepted a tender for £1,615 from Mr Parkhouse for the building of the new tearooms at Mentone Quarry. The council is also to build new conveniences under Grenville Terrace on the Sand Road, using the Government scheme of labour transfer from the distressed areas.

27 January 1979

A request by the lovers of naturism to frolic in the nude on beaches in North Cornwall is being taken seriously by district councillors. A move by the council's chairman to have the request killed at the very outset failed and he was appointed to meet the nudists to talk about their needs.


Sand is encroaching into the River Neet at Bude and is returning to its former channel. District councillors are worried that it could cause major problems if allowed to continue unchecked.

4 August 1990


Perfect weather conditions prevailed for the Bude Canal Society's first major public event at the Lower Wharf on Friday. Activities got under way with a flotilla of small boats coming up through the sea lock on the five o'clock tide to circle the Wharf. This was followed by an open air barn dance led by canalside resident Ron Mears.

16 July 1992

An archer class patrol boat will be locking into Bude Canal later this month. HMS Dasher, a coastal training craft from Bristol University Squadron, is due to visit the town for three days from July 28.
